## PUMP ENGINE FAILS Willing Hands Save Plant

A disastrous fire broke out on the Main Street of Provost in the heart of the business section early Sunday morning, March 10, which could have easily turned to a conflagration wiping out the entire business part of the village. As it was, however, three business buildings were completely destroyed and a third was extensively damaged.

The fire originated in the Red & White Store, operated by Ed. Lindberg, and spread to Ehlinger's Hardware, and from there took out The News Office building, and damaged the south wall of the Post Office, eating into the interior.

Start of the fire was first noticed by Dud Morrell about 6:20 a.m. when he reported smoke coming out of a window of the Red & White Store, and then helped remove the Walsh family who lived over the Ehlinger Hardware. The fire bell failed to arouse even half of the volunteer Fire Brigade, and on the third alarm the rope broke on the bell, and Dr. Perl with Blyth Seath ran around town in the doctors car sounding the horn and shouting, in an attempt to arouse more of the village's citizens.


There was some difficulty in getting the fire pump engine to start drawing water from the water reserve and the water reached the fire about 6:45 a.m. The chemical truck was run out to the fire, but because there was no member of the volunteer fire brigade present to operate the chmical, the pressure in the gas tank was wasted without the chemical ever being used at the most critical stage of the fire.
